Module Outline

Module 1 (13 September 2007) – Basic Principles of Wills & Probate

This Module will enable participants to contextualize and apply the key statutory provisions and case law governing inheritance and intestacy of non-Muslim estates. It will cover:

- Rationale for making wills
- Formal requirements, drafting and execution of wills under Singapore law
- Inheritance of property in cases of intestacy
- Application for maintenance out of estates
- Jurisdiction of courts in estate matters

Module 2 (20 September 2007) – Basic Principles Of Drafting Pleadings In A Civil Action

This topic will enable participants to have an overall view of pleadings and their respective purposes in a civil claim commenced by way of a Writ of Summons. It will cover:

- The nature and purpose of pleadings
- Essentials of well drafted pleadings
- How to draft a Statement of Claim – cause of action, particulars, prayers
- How to draft a Defence – implications of specific traverses and non-traverses
- Function and purpose of Counterclaims
- Appropriate situations to file a Reply.

Module 3 (27 September 2007) – Introduction to Conveyancing

This module aims to give a brief overview of the conveyancing process.

The topics that will be covered at an introductory level are:

1. Understanding the Conveyancing Process
2. The Role of the Law Firm in Sales and Purchases of Properties
3. Basic Principles of Caveats and Transfers
4. Understanding Mortgage and Central Provident Fund financing
5. Drafting a Completion Account

Module 4 (4 October 2007) – Basic Legal Research for Law Office Staff

This module aims to:

1. provide participants with an overview of what legal research entails
2. introduce participants to the various electronic and non- electronic based research tools
3. introduce participants to the process of systematic legal research

Module 5 (18 October 2007) – Basic Contract Law

The aim of this module is to provide participants with an understanding of the nature of contracts and the rights and obligations of contracting parties. It will cover:

1. Formation of contract – offer, acceptance, consideration, intention to create legal relations
2. Privity of contract and the Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act
3. Terms of contract – including incorporation of terms, and distinctions between conditions, warranties and innominate terms
4. Discharge of contract – including performance, breach, frustration
5. Remedies for breach of contract
6. Vitiating factors e.g. incapacity, duress, undue influence

Module 6 (25 October 2007) – Matrimonial Proceedings

Participants will be given an overview of the process of divorce and its possible outcomes. The course will include:

1. Grounds for divorce including adultery, unreasonable behaviour, separation
2. Divorce distinguished from annulment of marriage
3. Key stages of divorce proceedings
4. Definition of matrimonial assets
5. Drafting of divorce applications
6. Documents necessary for divorce proceedings
7. Considerations regarding ancillary matters, particularly arrangements as to children and division of assets.

About the Teaching Faculty

Mr Rudhran Rudy Gunaratnam (Module 1)

Mr Gunaratnam is Barrister-at-Law (Middle Temple) and was called to the Bar in Singapore in 1992. From 1992 to 2004, Mr Gunaratnam was active in litigation work in the Singapore courts in both civil and criminal matters. He was a legal associate and then partner with M/s Tan Rajah & Cheah and also spent 7 years practicing as a sole proprietor. In civil matters, he has handled the range of interlocutory applications, trials and appeals, and has undertaken work in property transactions and estate planning. Since January 2005 Mr Gunaratnam has been a lecturer with Temasek Polytechnic's Business School, under the Continuing Education & Training Division training adult learners. He now also teaches full-time students.

Mr Ch'ng Lye Beng (Module 2)

Ch'ng Lye Beng joined Temasek Polytechnic in November 2005 and teaches full-time students and adult learners in areas such as litigation-related subjects. A practicing Advocate and Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Singapore before joining Temasek Polytechnic, he was also a District Judge of the Subordinate Courts of Singapore and a Deputy Public Prosecutor with the Attorney-General's Chambers. He graduated from the National University of Singapore Law School in 1988 with LLB (Hons) before returning to his alma mater to do his LLM in 1993.

Ms Cynthia Lim (Module 3)

Ms Lim is an advocate and solicitor of the Supreme Court of Singapore. She obtained her LLB(Hons) from the National University of Singapore and a Master of Education from the University of Melbourne. Before joining the law division of Temasek Business School, Temasek Polytechnic in 1997, she was a conveyancing partner at M/s Yeo-Leong & Peh and an Assistant Manager of Singapore Press Holdings Ltd. Besides lecturing law, Ms Lim is also involved in professional development work with the Learning Academy in Temasek Polytechnic.

Mr Mark Chong (Modules 4 & 5)

Mark Chong is a PhD candidate in Law with the University of Sydney, who joined Temasek Polytechnic specially in adult education. He regularly teaches adults attending part-time courses in para-legal and law enforcement studies. He was a former referee of the Small Claims Tribunal and former Senior Deputy Head in the Criminal Justice Division of the Subordinate Courts. He is a Barrister-at-Law (Lincoln's Inn) as well as an advocate and solicitor (S'pore), and holds an LL.B and LL.M (Merit) from the University of London.

Mr Andrew Chia (Module 6)

Andrew Chia has been teaching in civil litigation-related subjects since he joined Temasek Polytechnic's Law Division in 1993. He is also one of the chief architects of the Diploma in Para-Legal Studies programme run by the Polytechnic and is familiar with the needs of the para-legal industry. Andrew practiced in a general civil litigation practice for more than 10 years. Besides an LL.B (Hons) from Singapore, he also holds a Master of Science from the University of Leicester.
